In a post-pandemic world, **what** does higher education look like?



While it's too soon to identify the long-term effects, it's abundantly clear the landscape for undergraduates has changed dramatically during the COVID-19 pandemic and will continue to shift over time.


Current and prospective students' plans are changing, as are their priorities. Many who thought they knew exactly where they were going in the fall are now reconsidering, and cost, safety, and flexibility are far more significant factors than before.

The pandemic has led to increased interest in online learning because of social distancing and other advantages of the modality, such as flexibility, affordability, and stability.

This guide, created by online learning experts, is for anyone facing college decisions soon: graduating high school seniors, transfer students, undergraduates who are rethinking plans, non-traditional students, and parents and guardians of college students.

It's intended to provide an in-depth look at the role of online education in a post-pandemic world — and the opportunities for students to find stability as they pursue academic goals in the midst of uncertainty.

Above all, prospective students need to know their options and understand the ways a robust online degree program will keep their education moving forward.



In spring 2020, as schools, colleges, and universities abruptly closed their campuses in response to COVID-19, they had to scramble to implement virtual instruction to finish the school year. Undoubtedly, this transition represented the best efforts of school administrators and teachers facing a crisis — but despite those efforts, the overall quality of instruction suffered. Students were left feeling understandably disillusioned.

For a huge percentage of high school seniors, current undergraduates, transfer students, and others who planned to make an enrollment decision to attend college in the fall, the spring 2020 emergency virtual instruction may be their only exposure to any form of online learning. Virtual instruction prompted by the COVID-19 pandemic resulted in forming false perceptions about the integrity of online learning. Overnight, a widespread view emerged that online learning is a backup plan — better than nothing in an emergency, but not as good as an on-ground education with face-to-face instruction.

Nothing could be further from the truth.

In reality, an established online degree program is radically different from ad hoc emergency virtual instruction. In order to make informed decisions, students who are weighing their options need to understand how degree programs that were designed to be delivered online work.


#### In-person programs were not prepared to move online.

When the COVID-19 pandemic arrived, there was a rapid scramble for educators to move online with limited resources and little opportunity to prepare — all at a moment when students, parents, and faculty were also facing numerous personal and professional difficulties.

COVID-19 made it clear that many K–12 schools lacked sufficient plans to serve students if a crisis interrupted traditional teaching methods. Likewise, universities and colleges rushed to find a way to move their on-ground programs into an online format. Even higher ed institutions with a proven track record in online learning had to navigate unique challenges.

While this shift represented the best efforts of teachers, administrators, and students, the result was frustrating: endless questions, concerns, and confusion about assignments, due dates, and expectations. For many families, online learning tools were rolled out quickly, with different systems and expectations for students at different grade levels or various programs.

Moreover, most of the tools used during the crisis were intended primarily for business meetings (e.g., Zoom), rather than dedicated learning management systems built solely for online learning. The level of student support, engagement, and assessment teachers were able to deliver in this format was limited.



#### Online degree programs are built with student success in mind.


An online degree program may have superficial similarities to emergency virtual instruction, but they are very different. Unlike programs that are launched quickly or created during a crisis, the best online courses are developed in advance by experienced faculty and course designers over the course of several months — and optimized, using well-studied best practices, for the distributed, technology-mediated online learning process.

Classes that suddenly went online as a result of COVID-19 weren't intended, nor designed, to be taught this way. They were an improvised experience delivered by and for people who didn't choose to attend school online and who had little support or prior experience in it.

Most online degree programs adhere to an asynchronous learning approach. This model allows students to access course materials, lectures, and complete assignments on their schedule while adhering to some fixed deadlines and due dates. This provides a highly flexible learning experience that is resilient against changes to a student's schedule, living conditions, or even infrastructure.

Unlike emergency virtual instruction in which students had to familiarize themselves with the learning environment on the fly, online programs are built to help students expedite their technology learning curve, allowing them to focus entirely on course content and positioning them for long-term academic success. Many online programs offer introductory training sessions to help students become familiar with the online learning environment (often referred to as the learning management system or LMS).

Due to the number of schools transitioning to virtual instruction during the pandemic, there was widespread confusion and misinformation about which online tools are best suited for different circumstances. Overnight, classroom teachers had to research which teaching methods were most effective online and how courses should be structured. Teachers and administrators were learning how to teach online as they experienced the crisis. Online degree programs, in contrast, are based on extensive and carefully organized research and experience, with carefully selected tools and teaching methods built to maximize student engagement and outcomes.



**The key takeaway:** when courses are designed and taught from the beginning with online learning in mind, there is no loss of educational quality. In a 2019 survey, the overwhelming majority (89%) of college students<sup>1</sup> with experience in both online and in-classroom learning stated their online instruction was the same quality as — or better than — education they gained from a traditional classroom.

Due to the pandemic, millions of American students have experienced the plan B version of online learning. The evidence is clear: this is not at all comparable to established online education programs.

While it's hard to overstate the sense of loss caused by missed commencement ceremonies or canceled sports and activities, a bigger long-term consequence of COVID-19 is its impact on students' future plans.

Anyone who was planning to attend college on campus in the fall, from graduating high school seniors to current undergraduates and transfer students, has experienced some level of disruption. Because of the timing and school closures, they're largely on their own, with limited support from guidance counselors, advisors, or teachers. It's up to students (and their parents) to figure out what's next.

So, what are they concerned about?

What are their **top priorities** in a post-pandemic world?

#### **AFFORDABILITY**

Due to the pandemic, millions of students have seen one or both of their parents furloughed, laid off, or working for a reduced salary. In this environment, the cost of a college education — not just tuition, but also room and board, transportation, meal plans, and other associated expenses — is particularly daunting.

Moreover, even families that haven't lost income yet are now keenly aware of the possibility of future income loss. As jobs seem less secure and the overall state of the economy appears uncertain, the prospect of taking on debt is frightening. Students and parents want to know how to pay for college without loans.

#### Enter the option of online degree programs.

Online degree programs are more affordable because there is no cost for room and board, meal plans, transportation costs, and so on. Moreover, asynchronous learning gives students more options to work or take on family obligations (e.g. childcare), helping the entire family's finances. Students who juggle those commitments find themselves in good company: the Wiley Education Services Online College Students 2019 study found the majority of online degree program students were also employed full-time.<sup>2</sup>

For students who plan to leverage federal aid assistance via federal student loans this year will benefit from the lowest interest rates in history. A recent CNN article stated that undergraduates can expect a 2.75% interest rate on a Federal Direct Stafford loan this academic year, down from 4.53% during the past school year.3

#### **FLEXIBILITY**

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit, colleges had to adapt quickly. Schools that primarily focus on on-campus instruction had to make a rushed transition to emergency virtual instruction (with mixed results). As lockdown orders went into effect, schools emptied dorms (many earning backlash from students and parents), and their ability to proactively communicate with students was tested.

In the wake of the pandemic, students are considering changing their plans, whether that means matriculating at a different school, transferring, or even taking a gap year. For instance, a March 2020 Plexuss survey<sup>4</sup> found that over half of college-bound seniors say they're more likely than before to stay closer to home, even after the pandemic ends — and more than a third of current undergraduates aren't sure whether they'll stay at their current colleges.

Online degree programs are more flexible because a learning management system (LMS) translates courses across digital devices (laptop, tablet, mobile). This allows students to turn almost any location into a classroom, from a beach to a coffee shop to their own bedroom. Moreover, established online learning programs have well-practiced methods for communicating with students proactively and over long distances, and they experienced comparatively little disruption due to COVID-19.

#### **SAFETY**

Safety is a top consideration at the moment for nearly every U.S. resident, and prospective and current college students are no exception. A college campus — where students pack into dormitories, crowd into lecture halls, and come and go frequently — is a difficult place to maintain social distancing or slow the spread of an infectious disease.

Online degree programs allow students to maintain social distancing and keep up with their studies even when quarantined or self-isolating. This truly is the gold standard of safety — without sacrificing the quality of education — in a post-pandemic world.




#### For many students, the solution is online

Graduating seniors, current undergraduates, and transfer students are assessing their options, and rightly so. For many, the right path is to pursue their college education online; the advantages of online learning are in many ways perfect for this moment.

If there's a silver lining to the current situation, it's the way innovators are using technology to raise the bar for flexibility, affordability, and accessibility. Online education is not a new phenomenon, and colleges and universities that have been doing this successfully know how to deliver a true college experience within the context of online learning.

This option, particularly now, should be (and increasingly is) very much on students' radar.





Let's talk about online education vs. traditional education.

In the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, prospective and current undergraduate students have shifting priorities. Some universal considerations rise to the top: safety, stability, and affordability.

So **how** does online education meet those critical needs?

Exceptionally well.

#### The safety advantages of online learning

To begin with the obvious: it's not possible to spread COVID-19 or any other physical illness online. The traditional college campus has students packed into lecture halls and people coming and going from campus 24 hours a day. Dormitories often mean shared living spaces, entryways, and bathrooms, making controlling one's own physical space challenging. This is an environment where diseases can spread quickly.

Online degree programs, of course, eliminate those risks entirely. Perhaps even more important than the inherent safety advantage of the online model is the freedom it gives students to take control of their safety.

The online learning model, with its portable and time-flexible elements, empowers students to determine their schedules and study environment — which means, in particular, that they can make individual decisions about acceptable risks and appropriate safety precautions.

Many of the safety precautions individuals and businesses are taking during COVID-19 involve tradeoffs. The power of traditional online learning, programs with content and assignment that are optimized for the online modality, is that there is no tradeoff in terms of academic quality.

Online degree programs deliver the same curriculum, often taught by the same faculty, as on-campus programs. Online students have access to the same resources (such as career services) and are able to visit campus if needed. The modality of day-to-day study is different, but online degree programs are built from the ground up to utilize the advantages of the modality and deliver an academic experience that matches or exceeds the quality of education in the classroom.

#### Online degree programs deliver stability

College has always been a refuge for young adults to find stability and opportunities for growth during difficult times. As we enter a post-pandemic world, online degree programs bring college students the chance to control their destiny.

Overnight, the COVID-19 pandemic put a spotlight on the operational continuity within universities and academic institutions. The arrival of the pandemic brought confusion to students and administrators alike, resulting in extreme disruption. Students lost their sense of stability. It's hard to overstate the impact this had on students' views of and trust in their institutions. As a March 2020 Plexuss survey put it:



6 in 10 current college students are "Very Dissatisfied" or "Dissatisfied" by how their institution has handled COVID-19 so far. Many told us this could impact whether they continue at a particular college or university.



ONLINE CLASSES allow students to MAKE their own schedules and to REDUCE their total debt.

Meanwhile, online degree programs exhibited high operational resilience and experienced little — if any — disruption. For an online degree program, content is already developed, and lectures are scheduled to launch right at the beginning of the semester. During a crisis, professors may need to alter due dates, modify or augment some content, and adjust expectations, but otherwise, online courses continue as planned.

#### Online degree programs address affordability concerns

Even before COVID-19, cost was a top priority for prospective college students. Indeed, the 2019 Wiley Education *Online College Students* survey found that affordability was **the top factor** for students considering an undergraduate program.<sup>5</sup> Now, as students and families face unemployment, furloughs, salary reduction, and overall economic uncertainty, finding ways to pay for college has become more complicated — but online students have substantially more options.

As a rule, the tuition cost per credit tends to be the same regardless of modality; however, tuition is only one of the costs (and sometimes not even the highest cost) involved in pursuing an on-campus college education. Going to college on campus means paying for housing, meal plans, transportation, and more. Another hidden expense is the opportunity cost of losing the flexibility to work and earn income.


Because online classes allow students to customize their schedules, they have flexibility to work part-time or full-time to earn additional income, or take on responsibilities at home, such as childcare, in order to help the family's overall finances. Online degree programs open the door for college students to become net revenue producers and reduce the total debt they and their families incur while furthering their education. This also means it's quicker and easier to reach the break-even point on an educational investment.

Some students may be (understandably) concerned that taking on those additional responsibilities, while helpful financially, may put them at a disadvantage academically compared to their peers. But juggling school, work, and family responsibilities is the rule, not the exception, for online students. A <u>U.S. News survey</u> of students in ranked online undergraduate programs, for example, found that 84% of those online students were employed.

#### College students have the opportunity to control their destiny

Online degree programs have delivered a safer, more stable, and more affordable experience for a long time, and the pandemic has shone a spotlight on those advantages. College students need programs that can adapt to changing circumstances, and for many, the solution is online.





"Is it worth it for me to go to college?"

More importantly, is it worth it for me to go to college now? That's the question many students like <u>San Francisco senior Kyra Kushner</u> have amid the COVID-19 pandemic. <sup>6</sup> They're unsure whether they'll get the experience they're paying for and have been looking forward to — and their experiences with emergency virtual instruction make them leery of the prospect of remote learning.

COVID-19 has forced plans to change. Incoming freshmen and transfer students alike have started to reassess their original enrollment decisions, with many placing a greater emphasis on factors like cost and stability. Other students are rethinking plans for the fall altogether, including delaying their enrollment and taking a gap year.

Nearly a quarter of prospective students are considering deferring enrollment to their preferred school by at least a semester or more, and some have even declined to apply to college at all, saying they'll just wait until next year.<sup>7</sup>

prospective students considering deferring enrollment Certainly, the prospect of taking a year off has an inherent appeal. But it's important for these prospective students to consider the potential hidden consequences of their decision carefully. What makes sense today could be problematic tomorrow.

#### What does a gap year during a pandemic look like, anyway?

One classic reason to plan a gap year is to travel, see the world, and pursue enrichment opportunities before starting college — learning through self-discovery. It's probable, though, that COVID-19 will significantly curtail international travel, and possibly domestic travel as well.



Likewise, students who intend to use the gap year to work may find their plans impeded by COVID-19. The pandemic has harmed nearly every business to some extent, but the types of businesses that are likely to employ high school students and recent graduates (e.g., movie theaters, restaurants, retail stores) are particularly hard-hit.

Especially with so many adults with more professional experience looking for jobs themselves, trying to find work during a recession may not be viable for recent high school graduates. And even students who were employed prior to the pandemic may not have jobs to return to when restrictions are lifted. Businesses are operating at reduced capacity because of pandemic-related restrictions (such as limited occupancy) and, in part, due to lower consumer demand while customers are also out of work.

That doesn't mean there aren't good reasons to take a gap year, but it does mean the decision should be considered carefully. Changing college enrollment plans on the fly could have serious consequences and long-term impact.

#### There's no guarantee that the same options will be open in a year.

Again, COVID-19 means most businesses are only operating with limited capacity, and colleges and universities are not immune to that trend. If a significant number of potential students choose not to attend college in Fall 2020, part-time professors, adjuncts, and guest lecturers may no longer be needed. This incremental workforce within colleges and universities helps institutions match class offerings to student demand. In turn, it also has a direct impact on the total number of students those institutions can admit within a single academic year. This trend could reduce the number of available spots for enrolling in Fall 2021 or later.

#### Competition in the 2021 academic year may also look different. Keep in mind that 2020 graduates who delay starting college will be competing next spring with 2021 graduates.

The goal of a gap year might be to keep one's options open, but in the post-pandemic landscape, those options are not guaranteed. While it's too soon to say for sure how difficult it will be to get into college in 2021, the risk is significant.

Even when students are ready to go to campus, there may not be a seat for them to occupy.

# When gap year results in permanent college postponement, long-term career consequences can follow.

It could become more common — the gap year that doesn't end. Decisions are made in a moment in time, and each passing moment presents a new set of circumstances that can further derail planned actions.

<u>One study found</u> that the college enrollment rate for gap year students a year later was 90%. Even that high figure still means that one in 10 students didn't end up going to college as initially planned — and again, that's a pre-pandemic figure looking primarily at *planned* gap years. It may be that students who take an *unplanned* gap year due to COVID-19 will have a significantly higher non-enrollment rate as their circumstances continue to evolve during the next year.



It's understandable that prospective students view committing to attending college in the fall as risky. It's also important to keep in mind that delaying college is a risky decision in itself.

For example, a 2019 study by the Community College Research Center found that students who do not enroll in college immediately after completing high school end up losing significant income over the long term.<sup>8</sup> It turns out, an important part of ensuring that you finish college is keeping your education moving forward. A gap year makes a student less likely to ultimately earn a four-year degree. A student who starts college immediately after high school will finish college sooner and begin acquiring professional, post-college work experience that carries far more value to future employers.



No one knows how the job market will look four years from now — but we know even less about how the job market will look *five* years from now and beyond. A <u>2018 CNN Money article</u> looked back on the Great Recession that began in late 2007 and found that it can take a decade or more for students who graduate during a recession to catch up financially. Faced with those prospects, delaying graduation only compounds the risk of having to play catch-up later.


What's clear is that students who keep their education on track and finish their degrees sooner will have more options when entering the job market.



#### Online learning is an opportunity to stay on track — while keeping your options open.

In short, the safest course of action for most prospective students is to keep their education moving forward to maintain long-term options and minimize disruption.

For students who don't want to be on campus in the fall, online education is an excellent alternative. An academically rigorous online degree program keeps students on track with their education while allowing them to stay home, maintain social distancing, and have the flexibility they need.



#### You can start online, stay or transfer.

It's also important to remember that going online for freshman year doesn't mean committing to four years of online education; it's relatively easy to transition from an online program to an on-campus program if and when the student feels comfortable doing so.

Completing the freshman year online is an opportunity to knock out gen-ed requirements and stay on pace for their desired on-campus university.

Other students find that they thrive in the online learning environment and elect to stay in their online programs despite their original plans.

Prospective students face unprecedented challenges right now, but the answer to those challenges is to keep their education on track as much as possible. For many students, online education — a safe, affordable, flexible option — is the answer.



#### Learning online means you're still part of a community

Humans crave social interaction. That has always been true, but people are feeling that need acutely right now due to social distancing and guarantine requirements.

In particular, prospective college students frequently look to meet new people and build new relationships. This is often a barrier for students who may be considering online degree programs:

Will they still have the personal connection with peers and professors that is such an integral part of the college experience?

In short: yes. In fact, going to college online creates unique opportunities to build a network that transcends geography and life circumstances.

#### It's not just taking online classes

A college education isn't just about the classroom, and that doesn't change when a college degree program is offered online. Online students still have access to resources provided by their institutions, and research shows that they take advantage of them. In particular, about two-thirds of online students take advantage of career services while enrolled. Online students also take advantage of services such as study skills development, time management, money management, health and wellness assistance, and more.<sup>10</sup>

While online learning makes it possible for students to attend colleges thousands of miles away if desired, the reality is that two-thirds of online students attend a college within a 50-mile radius of their home address. These students can absolutely visit campus (for instance, for sporting or social events) if desired. In some cases, online students can even receive a school ID to take advantage of student discounts at retailers, restaurants, and events.

The evidence also says that college students who take their classes online form a relationship with their alma mater that persists after graduation.<sup>12</sup> Nearly half of current and past online students have expressed interest in taking more classes at the same college in the future, and about a third intend to refer other students to the school or join the alumni association.


# Synchronous vs. asynchronous learning (and how they work together)

Synchronous ("same time") learning consists of elements that students experience together in real-time, while asynchronous learning includes features that students experience at separate times. The exact balance of synchronous and asynchronous elements varies between programs, but most include at least some of each.

Synchronous touchpoints (e.g., video conferences via Zoom, FaceTime, Google Hangouts, or Skype, as well as chats and telephone calls) are typically determined by mutual agreement between students, not assigned times. In contrast to the traditional classroom model, online degree programs allow students to have real-time interaction with each other on their schedules.

The basic concept of asynchronous learning has been around for a long time, but technology has made the modality far more robust. It's not just watching pre-recorded lectures and completing homework; elements such as team collaboration in Google Docs or forums within student Facebook or LinkedIn groups, as well as dedicated discussion forums within the learning management system, allow students to connect and collaborate on their schedules





#### A network of learners unrestricted by geography and lifestyle

Online programs are built with flexibility in mind, and students have the freedom to find the social interaction they need while maintaining a balance between school and other commitments. They can access classwork on-the-go using mobile devices or tablets, interact with classmates, and allow social connections to develop organically rather than trying to follow a set schedule.

This flexibility is more than just convenient. The online classroom truly brings together students from all walks of life, across the country and beyond, and places them in an environment where everyone has a voice. The format lends to community learning, conversation, and consensus-building, as each student has an equal opportunity to contribute their unique point of view to the discussion. In addition to providing more diverse perspectives on the subject matter, online learning builds relationships between this diverse array of students, creating a more robust post-graduate network when those students enter the job market.

Perhaps the best way to assess the online student experience is to ask students who have experienced both classroom and online learning. By this metric, online learning stacks up quite well: the overwhelming majority (89%) of students who have experienced both formats at the college level rated their online instruction as just as good as, or better than, their classroom instruction.<sup>16</sup>

Online students may be physically remote, but they are from disconnected.



Online learning has been a rapidly growing trend in recent years among traditional public and private non-profit institutions, but COVID-19 put the online modality under intense scrutiny.

Overnight, government officials, academic administrators, and degree seekers all scrambled to adopt and adapt to new tools, technologies, and instructional approaches. In most cases, this emergency approach to virtual instruction presented a false narrative. In reality, online education and the ability to earn an online bachelor's degree is not a new concept.

Many students and professionals alike have found great success and achieved their personal and professional aspirations by earning their advanced degree online.

So with so much information circulating, how do you know what's fact, and what is pure fiction?



Here are a few misconceptions that students have regarding online education and earning their bachelor's degree online.

#### MYTH An Online Education is Limiting.

Here's the truth. Online learning opens doors to opportunity. To some, online learning may seem new, but in reality, accredited online degree programs date back to 1996. Fast forward 24 years, and you'll find the polish, sophistication, and breadth of online degree programs offered today is immense.

One of the biggest benefits of earning a degree online is that the classroom is not limited by geographic location. Throughout the course of study, students build relationships with classmates from across the country, and in some instances, around the world.

This exposure not only diversifies a student's perspective on academic topics but also helps them build a strong peer network that can open the door to more opportunities post-graduation.

And with the number of online bachelor's degree offered to date, chances are high that there is a respected institution that offers a course of study that aligns to a student's interests and professional aspirations.

#### Learning Online is Isolating. MYTH

Here's the truth. Earning an online degree is a connected experience. Most learning management systems (LMS) are inherently designed for maximum peer-to-peer collaboration.

Discussion forums let students share their viewpoints on key topics and build a sense of community. Video tools such as Skype, Google Hangouts, and FaceTime allow students to connect face-to-face, virtually. Interestingly, it is common for online students to live within proximity to the campus. This means small, offline meetups can occur as needed while adhering to post-pandemic recommendations.

And these virtual interactions extend to faculty, too. With online degree programs being commonplace at most universities and colleges, instructors are well-versed in the online modality to ensure maximum student support throughout the program's entirety. Like students pursuing on-campus programs, online students have access to (virtual) office hours, on-campus meetings, and more.<sup>17</sup>

Rest assured, online students are not alone in their journey.

## The classroom is NOT LIMITED by geographic location.

#### MYTH Online Learning is Subpar to On-Campus.

**Here's the truth.** Online students get the same robust curriculum and knowledgeable instructors as on-campus students. Students absorb the material in familiar settings on a timeline that fits within their life and their schedule. Online coursework provides a high-level education within an easy-to-use online portal that's engaging, innovative, and just as rigorous as learning in person.<sup>18</sup>

In reality, online degree programs can offer flexibility and convenience that on-ground programs cannot.

#### MYTH Only Part-Time or Out-Of-State Students Study Online.

**Here's the truth.** Online degree programs are designed to cater to a range of student needs, from part-time to full-time. A key benefit to learning online is flexibility — the ability for students to craft a schedule and fit learning into their day-to-day lifestyle.

The online modality is especially appealing to students looking to work full-time while still furthering their education. The asynchronous format allows them to seamlessly balance work and academics without having to compromise one in favor of the other.


Whether it's the busy professional who lives five blocks from campus or a full-time student living out of state, online degree programs put success within reach, making it more attainable and less dependent on environmental or social circumstances.

#### MYTH Online Bachelor's Degrees Aren't as Credible.




